clue what the subject matter would be. Then I got to thinking how much has changed in my life as a result of joining the ACBS-Pacific Northwest Chapter. So plan to take you on a whirlwind trip down memory lane with me. My only regret is that I didn't join twenty years earlier.

To say that the ACBS has been a very big part of our lives over the last twelve years is an understatement! Like a James Michener book..."In the beginning", it all started with a weekend trip to Mahogany and Merlot to watch my brothers run their vintage Ron Jones '69 hydroplane. I fell in love with the antique and classic boats at the show and Ike Kielgass's Nameless

became the screensaver on my computer for the next year, that was 2010.

birthday to the Concourse d' Elegance at Lake Tahoe. While wandering through the showroom of Sierra Boat works, I saw an advertisement for a 1959 Chris-Craft Ski Boat. I checked out the boat and on the drive home it was decided we should try to buy the boat. One week later I drove back to Tahoe and brought Sh-Boom home. I joined the ACBS-PNW on August 26, 2011 and attended M & M in the fall of that year where I met so many members of the Chapter that have become great friends and mentors.



The next year at M & M, Patty and I had already decided we needed a bigger boat with more freeboard as it was impossible to enjoy a ride in 17' flat-bottomed Sh-Boom on Lake Tapps on a weekend. When I saw Tom and Janet Cathcart's

Huckledbuck take the Lady of the Lake's wake at about 25mph on the way to Stehikan, I made up my mind then and there that I wanted a Shepherd. It took a year but finally found a 22 foot 1961 Shepherd with a V-drive with the original 413 cu. inch Chrysler Golden Commando engine. Craig Magnusson agreed to fly with me to Omaha, NE down and back same day to see the boat. After looking at the boat Craig said "It's not as bad as I expected, you should buy it".

Over the next year Alan Thomle "preserved" (technical term which means 80 percent of the deck and topsides were kept as opposed to "restored" which can include replacement of decks and topsides). I cannot overemphasize how much Alan turned a lemon into lemonade replacing the vinyl ceiling boards and carpeted floors with Sapele along with a thousand other changes to turn Rhubarb into a gorgeous boat. Marty Haack of Blockhead Machine rebuilt the engine, transmission and v-drive. To this date, 8 years later the only maintenance required has been changing impellers and thermostats, amazing. I am forever indebted to both of these professionals for making Rhubarb a very special boat, I am prejudice but she is just possibly the finest Shepherd afloat.

In the fall of 2015 we attended the International Boat show at Gull Lake. Minnesota which began a tradition Patty and I never expected. We have taken Rhubarb to every International Boat Show since 2015. Each of our fall journeys has introduced us to amazing people and friends we will have forever. The shows are great. The locals always admire our boats and ask lots of questions. Ike Kielgass told me before our first trip that we would enjoy the pre-events more than the actual show. He was right, boating on beautiful and unique bodies of water alongside beautiful boats and like-minded boaters beats having our boats in "boat jail" while stuck on land.

I have written stories of some of these trips for past Wet Edge newsletters and I could tell aspects of each and everyone of the International boat Shows but instead I'm just going to give you a pictorial view of the shows we have attended. By the way, we have pulled Rhubarb 30k miles to these shows. We have never had a problem with the boat on any of these trips, however, I could write a whole another Wet Edge regarding towing issues including flat tires, failed brake calipers and blown transmission in tow rig.


with tour and boat pictures at Lambeau field, followed by cruises on Lake Winnebago and

Volunteers Needed Friday Feb. 3rd – Saturday Feb. 11th

Again, good fortune shines on our chapter as we have been given two display areas in the Seattle Boat Show 2023, starting Friday February 3rd through Saturday Feb 11th. This is a fantastic opportunity to showcase our hobby!

Our larger booth is 30 feet long and 24 feet deep, a perfect size for two boats. Across the aisle, we have another space, 18 feet by 11 feet. This is a good size for our display table and "Bobber", the kids' boat ride. Please let me know if you have any ideas for two boats to display to represent our chapter at the show or new display ideas for the smaller space.

I would like your ideas for the final layout by January 15th. And...yes we need volunteers for the booth! Volunteers receive a free ticket for your volunteer day(s), paid by our chapter. If you want to attend the Friday night Sails & Ales events (wine and beer tasting), I believe the cost of those tickets is \$10, which includes admission. Unfortunately the chapter isn't going to give you a free ticket to drink!

If you're planning on attending the show for several days, for the seminars or the boats afloat show at Pier 61, etc. Please let me know so we can arrange to get you a badge for the whole show for \$10.

This year our displays are located in the back northeast corner of the East Hall (see diagram). Our space is in front of the northeast loading door so we will be last in, either Thursday night or early Friday morning before the show starts at 10 am.

There are a few changes for this year's show. Volunteers will not be given lanyards by the boat show so please bring along a past boat show lanyard if you have one. If you buy a badge, it will be electronic on your phone, no lanyards or name tags as in past years.

Mark your calendars, send me your display ideas, and I'll be sending out the volunteer sign up info in the coming weeks.
